What's in the Shop?

- Refurbishing and relocating our 2005 Berghaus organ (III/46) for the new sanctuary at St. John's Lutheran Church, Bloomington, IL.
- Cleaning and solid state conversion of the organ for St. Mary's Catholic Church, Rock Island, IL
- Console renovation and solid state conversion of the organ for First Presbyterian Church, Arlington, Heights, IL.
- Cleaning and fire restoration of the organ for Christ the King Catholic Church, South Bend, IN

The organ at First Lutheran offers comprehensive musical resources across three manuals and pedal. The organ's tonal design and nomenclature lean in the Germanic tradition in homage to the church's heritage. Generous foundation tone and bold 8' and 4' Principals can be found to effectively lead and inspire congregational song. A wide variety of flutes, strings, and reeds are also available on each manual to provide limitless color and a seamless crescendo. One particularly beautiful, but unusual, stop is the Choir 4' Zauberflote. Modeled on 19th Century English examples, it is overblown and of capped metal and harmonic construction. A generously appointed console, built to AGO Standards, controls the instrument with a Peterson ICS-4000 combination acion.
